Show You Care with Safety-Minded Gifts

As you create your holiday gift list this year, consider adding safety-minded gifts as a way to show you care. From a smart doorbell to a smoke detector, a gift that keeps loved ones safe gives peace of mind and could help save lives.

Consider the following tips and gift ideas to help keep everyone on your gift list safer this holiday season and throughout the year:

For adults

- ▶ Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors
- ► A flashlight with extra batteries for emergencies
- ► A roadside emergency kit
- ▶ Reflective clothing for runners or walkers
- ▶ Gloves with LED lights or hand-held "knuckle lights" designed for runners
- ▶ A smart doorbell to see who's at the door while at home and away
- Gift certificates for home services (home maintenance, such as HVAC inspection or chimney sweeping)
- ▶ A fire extinguisher for the kitchen
- ▶ A pack of GFCI (ground fault circuit interrupter) outlets and a gift certificate for a qualified electrician to install them
- ► A cozy bed blanket to replace an older electric blanket; those more

- than 10 years old are often unsafe
- ▶ Aftermarket safety systems for cars that don't have them, which include features such as forward-collision and lane-departure warnings
- A rear-view camera and dash cam for vehicles not equipped with them
- A pet harness for use in a vehicle; make sure it has earned crash-test certification

For kids and youth

- ► Age-appropriate gifts (see recommendations on box or toy); children younger than age 3 should not have access to toys with small parts and avoid marbles and small balls for small children
- ► Safety gear such as helmets and knee and elbow pads when gifting scooters, roller blades, bikes and other riding
- ▶ Hover boards—these should be compliant with UL safety standards (new hover boards that are UL 2272 certified are fire safe; boards bought before 2016 do not have this certification)
- Many gaming consoles are equipped with internet browsers and chat features that allow players to communicate with each other, so be aware of these capabilities in any game or electronic device

Ninnescah Returns Capital Credits

The Ninnescah Rural Electric Board of Trustees has approved the return of capital credits to the electric cooperative membership. The capital credits will be returned to members for the remaining balance of 1988. This reflects your ownership in the cooperative during that specific period of time. The capital credit checks are scheduled to go out the latter part of December.

You might not realize it, but when you signed up to receive electric service from Ninnescah Electric, you became a member and owner of an electric utility. While investor-owned utilities return a portion of any profits back to their investors, electric co-ops operate on a not-for-profit basis. So, instead of returning excess funds, known as margins, to investors who might not live in the same region as you do, we issue capital credits to you. The goal of the Ninnescah Board of Trustees is to return the margins on a regular rotating basis, starting with the oldest capital credits first.

Salami Cream Cheese Pepperoncini Rollups

- 1 − 8 oz. pkg cream cheese 18 slices pepperoncini
- ▶ 18 slices thinly sliced salami
- peppers, drained or to taste

Spread about 1½ teaspoons softened cream cheese over a slice of salami; top with 1-3 slices of pepperoncini pepper. Roll the salami around the cheese and pepper. Secure with a toothpick. Repeat with the remaining ingredients. Serve immediately.

Mixed Nut Tarts

- ▶ 10 Tbsp. unsalted butter
- ▶ ½ cup packed brown sugar
- ▶ ½ cup sugar
- ▶ ¼ cup heavy cream
- ▶ 1 (10-oz.) can honey roasted mixed nuts
- ▶ 1 tsp. vanilla
- ▶ 3 (15-ct.) packages mini phyllo shells

Preheat oven to 350 F. Place phyllo shells on parchment lined baking sheet. In a large saucepan, combine butter, brown sugar, sugar, and heavy cream. Stir over high heat until blended and starting to boil. Reduce heat to medium and boil gently, stirring often, for 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Carefully stir in vanilla and mixed nuts. Allow to cool slightly. Divide filling among phyllo shells. Bake for 12-15 minutes. Let cool before serving.

Crumb Coffee Cake

- ► 2 1/3 cup sugar, divided
- ▶ ½ tsp. cloves
- ▶ 3 cup flour
- ▶ ½ tsp. salt
- ▶ ¾ cup shortening
- ▶ 2 tsp. baking soda
- ▶ ½ tsp. nutmeg
- ▶ 2 cup buttermilk*

Combine 2 cups sugar, flour, shortening, nutmeg, cloves and salt. Reserve one cup of mixture for topping. Add soda and buttermilk* to remaining mixture. Pour mixture into 9x13 pan. Add 1/3 cup of sugar to the one cup of mixture reserved for topping, sprinkle over top of cake batter. Bake at 350 F for 35 to 40 minutes. *A "wee bit" of vinegar may be added to milk in place of buttermilk.

Perfect Southern Pecan Pralines

- ▶ 1 ½ cups pecan halves or chopped pecans
- ▶ 1½ cups granulated white sugar
- ▶ ¾ cup brown sugar
- ▶ ¼ cup + 2 Tbsp. unsalted butter, cubed
- ▶ ½ cup evaporated milk
- ▶ 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- ▶ ½ tsp. kosher salt

Line 2 cupcake tins with about 16-20 paper liners. Set aside. In a large, heavy-bottomed saucepan, combine the pecan pieces, sugars, butter, evaporated milk, vanilla extract, and salt and bring to a boil over medium heat. Stick in a candy thermometer and stir constantly while boiling until temperature reaches 235-240 F, about 10 minutes. Remove pan from heat and working quickly and CAREFULLY, beat the mixture vigorously with a wooden spoon until mixture thickens and almost turns cloudy and opaque in color, about 2-5 minutes. Working fast, use a spoon or cookie dough scoop to portion the hot candy into each muffin tin, covering the bottom of the muffin cup. You should get about 16-20 candies, depending on how much you fill each cupcake tin. Cool the candy COMPLETELY. Candy is ready once it's reached room temperature and is firm and solid. Peel away cupcake liners before serving.

Single batches recommended as the candy hardens quickly. If you have leftovers store covered at room temperature.
